Reidos enjoyed the cooking class we took


Shaylee said she loved the lantern boat ride, straight out of the tangled scene.



Creating My Footprint

All Year 9 and 10 students are required to make a booking for Course Counselling. Students must attend the session with a carer/parent. Please only make one booking, with one teacher, at a time that suits you. The course counselling appointment must be booked through the parents Compass account.

It is highly recommended to attend the VCE Information Session before attending your interview. These will be held in the forum at the following times:

9:30am 11:30am 1:00pm 3:30pm 4:45pm

On this day families will have access to external providers, such as GO TAFE, Headstart, Kangan etc. Families will also be able to speak with current VET students about their experiences and collect information from Learning Area stalls on subjects offered at Broadford Secondary College. This can be found in the Literacy Building.

Japanese sister school visit.

Thanks to all the families in the BSC community who have expressed interest in hosting Japanese students in term 3. We are still seeking host families for a few more students. If you are interested in finding out more, please find details below and feel free to contact the school for more information.

What does a sister school visit involve?

20 students and 2 staff from Katsuta will visit us for 4 nights. They arrive Saturday 29th July and will depart Wednesday morning on August 2nd. The students range from year 9 to year 11. They will stay with host families in our school community for the 4 nights. They spend the weekend with the host family and come into school on Monday and Tuesday to take part in activities with BSC students.

What does a host family have to do?

You need to be able to provide accommodation for a Japanese student for 4 nights. If you would like to host a Japanese student (or students) we ask you to have a current Working with Children Check. I will be asking for expressions of interest in upcoming newsletters and can assist anyone who needs help with this.

We will have profiles of all the students, so we can find out about dietary needs (or just what they like or don't like eating) as well as any necessary medical information, their hobbies and interests.

The students are here to practice their English. Though they may seem shy at first, they quickly develop in confidence as they get to practice their conversation skills with you.

You don't need to plan activities and trips. They are here to experience life with an Australian family – so your usual weekend activities are all fine. Supermarket shopping, weekend sports and activities at home are all part of the experience.

ATTENDANCE

If you require your student to depart school early can you please provide a signed note that they can hand to their teacher to enable them to leave the classroom and make their way to the General Office.

Parents are asked to collect their student from the General office and sign them out via the Compass Kiosk.

Can parents ensure that all attendance be added to Compass as soon as practically possible.

Late arrivals need to enter via the General office and sign themselves in on the Compass Kiosk, we ask that you provide a written note to explain why your student is late.

All Notes and Medical Certificates should be handed to the Attendance officer in the General Office.

CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE

The conveyance allowance is a form of financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest appropriate school/campus. The conveyance allowance is available to eligible students travelling by public transport, private car and private bus. The conveyance allowance is also available to eligible students whose nearest school is not serviced by a free school bus.

Eligibility criteria:

The eligibility criteria varies depending on the type of school attended and where it is located.

Students attending a government or non-government school must:

- Attend their nearest government or non-government school/campus appropriate to their year level at which admission is permissible
- be enrolled at a school/campus outside Melbourne's metropolitan conveyance boundary
- reside 4.8km or more by the shortest practicable route from that school/campus attended
- be of school age (5 to 18 years old at time of application) and reside in Victoria.

Term 2 – 02 June 2023

Term 3 – 25 August 2023

Term 4 – 24 November 2023

PURPOSE

To ensure that members of our community understand Broadford Secondary College's expectations for appropriate interactions with school staff.

POLICY

Staff at Broadford Secondary College, including teachers, education support staff, office staff, the Assistant Principal/s and Principal are committed to providing a positive and supportive learning environment for all our students. Our staff take their work very seriously and feel privileged to be able to play an important role in each child's education.

Parents/carers and visitors to our school also have an important role to play in fostering a safe and inclusive environment for the entire school community.

Respectful behaviours within the school community

All staff at Broadford Secondary College have a right to a safe and supportive work environment, and we expect that parents/carers and visitors behave in an appropriate and respectful manner at all times.

The Department of Education and Training has outlined expectations on parent/carer behaviour within Victorian government school communities in the <u>Respectful Behaviours within the School Community Policy</u>.

Unacceptable behaviours

When parents and carers engage in unacceptable behaviours against a staff member or another member of the school community, this can affect their health, safety and wellbeing.

Unacceptable behaviours include, but are not limited to:

- being violent or threatening violence of any kind, including physically intimidating behaviour such as aggressive hand gestures or invading another person's personal space
- speaking or behaving in a rude, aggressive or threatening way, either in person, via email, social media, or over the telephone
- sending demanding, rude, confronting or threatening letters, emails or text messages
- discriminatory or derogatory comments
- the use of social media or public forums to make inappropriate or threatening remarks about the school, staff or students.

At the Principal's discretion, unacceptable behaviour may be managed by:

- requesting that the parties attend a mediation or counselling sessions
- implementing specific communication protocols
- written warnings
- conditions of entry to school grounds or school activities
- exclusion from school grounds or attendance at school activities
- reports to Victoria Police
- legal action

The Principal may also seek support from Department of Education and Training staff when managing unacceptable parent or carer behaviour.

Respectfully raising complaints

We welcome complaints from parents and carers if they are communicated in a respectful and constructive way. Complaints and concerns raised with us can help our school community by providing feedback to improve how our school operates.

When raising a complaint or concern with us, Broadford Secondary College expects all members of our community to act consistently with this policy, our *Statement of Values and School Philosophy* and the Department's <u>Respectful Behaviours within the School Community Policy</u>.

For information on how to raise a complaint or concern with our school, refer to our Broadford Secondary College Parent Complaints Policy.

The <u>Family Engagement in Learning</u> is also a useful Department resource outlining how parents and carers can best engage with schools to provide feedback, suggestions and complaints.
