

#### **School Saving Bonus**

Information for government school parents and carers

About the School Saving Bonus

The Victorian Government is making life that little bit easier for families by providing a one-off \$400 School Saving Bonus.

This support will help cover the cost of school uniforms, textbooks, and school activities like camps, excursions and sports.

The School Saving Bonus is in addition to existing and continuing means-tested supports for Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) and the Affordable School Uniforms Program.

The School Saving Bonus will be provided to schools and families in Term 4, 2024.

Who receives the School Saving Bonus

The School Saving Bonus is available for parents and carers of all Victorian government school students from Prep to Year 12 in 2025, except for full-fee international students, home schooled students, TAFE students and students attending kindergarten in 2025.

Actions for parents and carers

Parents and carers of children who meet the School Saving Bonus eligibility above are required to do the following by **Friday 18 October 2024**:

#### **Complete enrolment**

If your child, or children are changing government school for Term 1 2025, or starting Prep or Year 7 in 2025, please complete enrolment. For more information, read about

Enrolling in School.

#### **Check your contact information**

Ensure your contact information is up to date with your school. You can check this information by contacting your school directly.

Accessing the \$400 School Saving Bonus

You do not need to apply for the School Saving Bonus.

The Department of Education will email you in November 2024 with your \$400 School Saving Bonus You will be able to access it via an online system.

You can decide how to best use the School Saving Bonus for your family's needs.

You can choose how to allocate the \$400 in the online system.

The bonus can be used towards 2025 school costs, which may include:

camps, trips, excursions and incursions swimming and sporting programs outdoor education programs graduations school uniforms textbooks.

The bonus can be used at your school's approved textbook or uniform suppliers either in-store or online, or through State Schools' Relief. The list of suppliers may include a school uniform or bookshop. Any amount that you choose to allocate to textbooks and uniforms will be valid until 30 June 2025. It will then transfer to your child's school account for future activities.

Funds will roll over for use in future years if it is not all spent in 2025.

Families with more than one eligible child

Families who have more than one child at the same school can combine their School Saving Bonus payments to use on one child, or for a specific activity. So, for example, a family with 3 children who are all government school students would receive support to the value of \$1,200 and choose how they spend those funds. The School Saving Bonus cannot be combined across different schools.

#### Policy

The purpose of this policy is to support public health objectives and ensure there is no smoking or use of e-cigarettes (commonly known as 'vaping') on school premises (buildings and grounds), within 4 metres of school entrances or at school sanctioned events held off-premises.

#### Summary

- In Victoria, a person must not smoke or use e-cigarettes on school premises or within 4 metres
  of any pedestrian access point to school premises.
- Inhaling vapour from an e-cigarette is known as 'vaping'. When using an e-cigarette, the user
  inhales and exhales the vapour, which can look similar to smoking a cigarette. The prohibition
  on smoking includes the use of e-cigarettes (vaping) and applies whether or not the e-cigarette
  contains nicotine.
- · Cigarettes and e-cigarettes cannot be sold to people under 18 years of age.
- It is a legislative requirement that schools display suitable 'No Smoking' signs at all pedestrian
  access points (entrances) to the school grounds. The legislation defines smoking to include the
  use of an e-cigarette.
- In Victoria, a person must not smoke in a motor vehicle if a person under 18 years is also present in the motor vehicle.
- Smoking and vaping are also not permitted during school events and excursions held off school premises.

#### Details

A person must not smoke cigarettes including e-cigarettes (regardless of whether they contain nicotine) within school premises and within 4 metres of any pedestrian access to school premises. Smoking in these places is a fineable offence.

Schools must display 'No Smoking' signs and enforce the ban to prohibit smoking and vaping on school premises (including buildings and grounds) and within 4 metres of school entrances.

The smoking and vaping ban applies to:

- anyone present on school premises during and outside of school hours including students, teachers, contractors, parents or carers or the wider community, such as sporting groups
- all activities that take place on school premises including pre-schools, kindergartens, outside school hours care, cultural, sporting or recreational activities and school fetes.

Smoking and vaping are also not permitted during school events and excursions held off school premises.

#### Schools must:

- display 'No Smoking' signs at each pedestrian access point to the school premises. Free
  'No Smoking' signs can be ordered and downloaded through the Department of Health and
  Human Services website refer to the Resources tab
- display the signs in such a prominent position at each entrance to make it clear that the area at
  or within 4 metres of that entrance is a 'no smoking' area.

#### Principals or their delegate should:

- ensure that the whole school community is aware that smoking and vaping are not permitted on school premises and within 4 metres of school entrances. This may be achieved through the signage required at each entrance. If further measures are required (due to non-compliance), notices in the school newsletter, on the school website and direct communication with specific staff, students, parents/carers or visitors who are non-compliant may be required
- remind the school community that smoking and vaping are not permitted at school-sanctioned events held off school premises
- where relevant remind staff that a person must not smoke in a motor vehicle if a person under 18 years is also present in the motor vehicle
- · encourage Department employees who require support complying with the ban to either:
  - call the Quitline on 13 7848. Quitline is a friendly, confidential telephone service. A
     Quitline counsellor is trained to listed carefully and provide practical advice tailored for
     each person.
  - use the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) or contact LifeWorks (1300 361 008)
- if necessary, arrange training with Quit Victoria on how to support staff and young people to guit
- make tobacco education information available. Education resources are available in the Resources tab.

#### Electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes), commonly known as 'vaping'

In Victoria it is illegal for any person aged 18 or over to obtain, possess or use nicotine e-cigarettes, or e-cigarette cartridges containing nicotine, or nicotine liquids for use in a vaporiser, without a prescription. It is illegal to sell e-cigarettes to, or buy e-cigarettes for, any person aged under 18 years whether or not the e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Whilst it is not unlawful for a person to possess or use e-cigarettes that do not contain nicotine, it is unlawful to use them on school premises or within 4 metres of a school entrance.

#### Resources and school supports

The Resources tab contains guides to assist schools, parents and the whole school community to talk to children and young people about the dangers of smoking and vaping, and support young people who do smoke and/or vape to quit. Template wording is also available to assist schools in sharing information about smoking and vaping with parents and carers through their school communication channels (for example, their school newsletter).

School and area-based health, wellbeing and inclusion workforces can also assist with providing support to students who smoke or vape:

- Doctors in Secondary School Program
- Secondary School Nursing Program
- · Student Support Services Program
- Mental Health Practitioners in Schools
- Primary Welfare Officers
- Koorie Engagement Support Officers.

Consequences for Students Found Smoking, in the possession of cigarettes or vapers, buying cigarettes or vapers from other students or supplying cigarettes or vapers to other students, or as a bystander in the company of smokers or vapers, anywhere in the school environment or whilst travelling to or from school, will be liable to a range of consequences dependent on the circumstance and whether or not previous offences have been recorded, at the discretion of the principal

#### First incident:

- Inform parent/guardian via phone call
- Official warning
- Incident report recorded on Compass
- Educative conversation with the School Nurse
- · Community service
- · Exclusion from area where smoking or vaping occurred

#### Second Incident:

- · Inform parents/guardian via phone call and formal letter
- Incident report recorded on Compass
- · Referral to Wellbeing team for counselling
- QUIT information supplied to student
- Exclusion from area where smoking or vaping occurred
- Community service and/or detention with Year level Coordinator

#### Third Incident:

- Incident report recorded on Compass
- · Formal letter to parent/guardian
- · Suspension from school
- Student support group convened with the student, parent/guardian, year Level Coordinator and Student Wellbeing person

#### Continued:

If the behaviour continues the student will be suspended for each further incident and support outlined above to continue. In extreme circumstances a student may be expelled.

#### Definitions

Electronic cigarettes (e-cigarettes) are electronic devices which heat and vaporise liquids that may or may not contain nicotine or flavouring agents. The vapour is inhaled, simulating the act of smoking. Use of e-cigarettes is commonly referred to as 'vaping'.

#### **CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE**

The conveyance allowance is a form of financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest appropriate school/campus. The conveyance allowance is available to eligible students travelling by public transport, private car and private bus. The conveyance allowance is also available to eligible students whose nearest school is not serviced by a free school bus.

#### Eligibility criteria:

The eligibility criteria varies depending on the type of school attended and where it is located. Students attending a government or non-government school must:

- Attend their nearest government or non-government school/campus appropriate to their year level at which admission is permissible
- be enrolled at a school/campus outside Melbourne's metropolitan conveyance boundary
- reside 4.8km or more by the shortest practicable route from that school/campus attended
- be of school age (5 to 18 years old at time of application) and reside in Victoria.
